8th SABIS[®] Regional Tournament Brings 1,000+ Academic Athletes Together

Two SABIS® schools in Lebanon—SABIS® International School-Adma and the International School of Choueifat-Choueifat—recently coordinated to host the 8th SABIS® Regional Tournament. This year's tournament brought together more than 1,000 SABIS® Academic Athletes from 23 SABIS® schools across 13 countries including Germany, Pakistan, Romania, and the United Arab Emirates, among many others.

The sporting event, held on April 8-9, 2011, was kicked off with an elaborate opening ceremony. "It was truly a grand occasion where all the teams marched onto the field accompanied by the music of the Lebanese Military Marching Band," said an SIS-Adma parent. After the procession, Lebanon's Minister of Youth and Sports, Dr. Ali Abdallah, gave the opening speech in which he stressed the important role of the SABIS® School Network in providing high-quality education worldwide.



SABIS® Vice President, Mr. Victor Saad, also made an opening statement and emphasized that participating in the tournament was not about winning a trophy. "Playing sports is primarily a competition...This means there will always be winners and losers, but it is not only about winning or losing. It is also about participation; it is about team spirit; it is about learning to win with humility and learning to lose with grace," said Mr. Saad in his speech.

The speeches were followed by inspiring performances from the three SABIS® schools in Lebanon. SIS-Adma students showed off their voices with a song; ISC-Choueifat students awed the crowd with a traditional Lebanese *dabke* dance; and the International School of Choueifat-Koura students dazzled the audience with a solo vocalist performance and a contemporary dance.

Immediately following the opening ceremony, the new SIS-Adma Olympic-sized track and field was officially inaugurated with a ribbon-cutting ceremony, and then the competitions commenced. The SABIS® Academic Athletes who spent months preparing for the tournament enthusiastically demonstrated their athletic talents in several sporting events ranging from relay races and swimming to basketball and soccer.

The 23 participating SABIS® schools had their share of students who won medals—gold, silver, and bronze. Most notably, ISF Internationale Schule Frankfurt-Rhein-Main

took home a total of five gold medals in swimming and sprint; the International School of Choueifat-Cairo left with five gold medals in swimming and sprint, with the rest of the swimming and sprint gold medals shared between the International School of Choueifat-Amman and the King Abdul Aziz International School in Saudi Arabia, leaving the gold medals in long jump to the International School of Choueifat-Lahore and ISC-Amman. Additionally, the tournament participants set an impressive eleven records in the history of the SABIS® Regional Tournament, with new records in swimming, long jump, and sprint competitions.

The two-day sporting function attracted many local and international spectators who came to support the students and enjoy the competition and the entertaining atmosphere. "I was impressed by the students who competed with passion yet always displayed genuine sportsmanship. Despite it being a competitive atmosphere, most students, if not all, left the tournament with a new circle of friends from around the world. It was very inspiring!" said an ISC-Choueifat parent.

The prefects were in every football and basketball court, at the information desk, welcoming the parents, and even helping in the cafeteria. Each team had a prefect shadowing their every move, so that no team was left confused or ignored," commented

ISC-Choueifat Student Life Coordinator, Ms. Zeina Abou Zelof. "It was a fun and also an educational experience for them. Prefects learned responsibility, teamwork, and motivation. They also gained new friends from all over the world and got to spend a day laughing and helping others," she added.







SABIS® Schools Close the Achievement Gap

Since 1886, SABIS® has been driven to make a difference worldwide by providing a high-quality education that meets the demands of a rapidly changing, global society. Across the global SABIS® School Network through the SABIS® Educational System, students from a wide variety of ethnic and socio-economic backgrounds are equipped with the knowledge and skills they need to achieve success.

The effectiveness of the SABIS® Educational System in meeting a wide variety of student needs is clearly demonstrated in two SABIS® U.S. charter schools. In a report entitled *Closing the Achievement Gap: The* SABIS® *Story*, outcomes in two large K-12 charter schools in the U.S., SABIS® International Charter School (SICS) in Springfield, Massachusetts, and the International Academy of Flint (IAF) in Flint, Michigan, are presented.



With a total combined enrollment of nearly 2,800 students, of which 76% are considered minorities, these two SABIS® schools are dramatically raising the standard of education in the communities they serve by consistently narrowing the achievement gap.



Using the results of 35 Massachusetts Comprehensive Assessment System (MCAS) and Michigan Educational Assessment Program (MEAP) exams administered to SICS and IAF students in grades 3-11 during the 2009-10 academic year, these two SABIS® schools, combined, closed the gap between African-American and Caucasian students on 13 of the 35 tests (37%). Furthermore, the state exam results indicate that the schools significantly narrowedthegap between African-American and Caucasian students at their respective schools, in comparison to their states, on 20 of the 35 tests (57%). Therefore, on 94% of the tests, these two charter schools either closed the gap completely or had narrower gaps than the states in which they operate.

"By using the proven SABIS® instructional methods, curriculum, and weekly assessment system, these two large public charter schools are going against the grain

and demonstrating that all students can achieve high expectations," said SABIS® V.P. of U.S. Operations, Mr. George Saad. "They're dispelling the myth that some students cannot learn and proving that larger class sizes and a rigorous college-preparatory curriculum, along with weekly exams to assess learning, are effective in helping students rise to the challenge."

In addition to narrowing the ethnic achievement gap, the report's results indicate that SICS and IAF were also successful in narrowing the gap between economically-disadvantaged

students and their more privileged peers. At SICS, the socioeconomic gap average is 12% in comparison to a gap of 32% in the state. At IAF, the school's economically-disadvantaged students outperform the state's on 12 of 14 exams.

SICS and IAF, like the seven other SABIS® U.S. charter schools, implement the proven SABIS® Educational System. Regular assessment, high expectations for student performance and behavior, and involvement in the school through Student Life all contribute to the success of these schools at closing the achievement gap and preparing students for a bright future.

SABIS® recently partnered with IT giant Hewlett-Packard (HP) to improve efficiency at its schools in the Middle East and North Africa.




SABIS® Students Using Thin Client Computers

Through the organization's new agreement with HP, SABIS® is reaching this goal and has begun deploying HP thin clients, computing devices that enable IT efficiency at a lower cost.

Thin clients are small solid-state devices that connect over a network to a server where most of the processing takes

place. SABIS®'s utilization of this technology allows for more secure storage of data and applications on its servers as thin clients have no hard drive. Plus, without a hard drive, fan, or other moving parts, SABIS® computers with thin clients use much less power and have an extended lifespan. Moreover, thin clients require lower maintenance costs as software application updates, virus scanning, and patches can be carried out on the server. This savings can in turn help SABIS® fulfill its Core Purpose of providing students with an outstanding education at a reasonable cost.

ISF Students Contributing to the Habitat for Humanity Project

ISF Students Participate in Overseas Habitat for Humanity Project

Thirteen students from ISF Internationale Schule Frankfurt-Rhein-Main in Frankfurt, Germany, recently put their winter break to good use and participated in a Habitat for Humanity project in Gliwice, Poland.

The students, in grades 11-12, began planning their project five months earlier, back in September 2010, when they decided to forgo a typical winter break for an alternative one where they would give back by assisting in the renovation of a building for use as a shelter for homeless women

and children in Poland. Remarkably within five months, ISF students raised more than \$14,000 (EUR 10,000) to cover most of the expenses of their trip as well as a material and supply donation to Habitat for Humanity.

The Habitat for Humanity project involved turning a large, 100-year-old building into a women's shelter. ISF students along with a Habitat for Humanity team renovated 88 window panes over the course of five days. "The students were sanding and stripping paint, among many other tough tasks. I was extremely

pleased with their contribution to the project," commented ISF Student Life Coordinator, Ms. Eve Yildiz, who accompanied the students on their trip. "The time spent on the building site proved to be a feat of mental perseverance and personal motivation for the group," she added.

Commenting on his will to follow through on the Habitat for Humanity project despite the taxing work, ISF 11th grader, Joo Hyung Park said, "I'm proud to know that the project we worked on will turn out to be a shelter for women. That kept me motivated when I was working," Ms. Yildiz added, "The cause touched all the ISF team members and provided them with necessary motivation for the five days of work."

In addition to playing an important role in the Habitat for Humanity project, ISF students gained new friendships through their service. "One of the best things I felt was camaraderie. I think that we've all grown together to become friends with people we really didn't know at the school," stated Evan Martin, a Grade 11 student at ISF.

Habitat for Humanity is a non-profit organization dedicated to providing safe and secure housing for people in need around the world with the help of volunteers.
