Highlight of the Issue

The International School of Choueifat - Choueifat

From its humble beginnings in the dilapidated silk factory where the school started, the 120 year journey of the "Choueifat School" has been a long and exciting journey. Like all journeys, it has had its share of ups and downs, successes and failures, joy and sorrow, but it has maintained its upward course at all times. The difficulties it faced on the way only reinforced the resolve of the founders and those who followed to continue in the face of all adversity.

In the world today, there seems to be a consensus that raising the living standards in a country starts in the classroom. One hundred and twenty years ago, Rev. Tanios Saad, a man in his twenties, convinced Miss. Louisa Procter, a middle-aged missionary, that the relief work she was doing to improve the status of women would only have a temporary effect. He told her, in his very


persuasive manner, that what was needed was an education for women. They put their meager resources together and decided to start a school for girls. The school opened its doors on October 15, 1886.

The school started with an enrollment of twenty-eight girls – fifteen boarders and thirteen day students. As it showed early signs of success, parents started asking for a similar facility for their sons. Three years later a parallel boys' school was started, for co-education was not an option at the time.

Before the turn of the century, about ten years later, Tanios Saad took the long journey to England to seek help and take a closer look at developments in the world of education. Miss Procter's connections and acquaintances were invaluable in opening doors for him there.

The school continued to grow and attract students from neighboring countries but with the advent of the First World War things changed dramatically. All the human and financial resources dwindled; food was in short supply; and the school continued only by sheer determination. In the late twenties and early thirties, the school started to grow again and it began attracting students from the neighboring countries.

The Second World War was a period of financial prosperity for Lebanon and, contrary to the First World War, saw the school grow. In 1942, Mr. Charles Saad was officially asked by his father to take over the running of the schools. Many improvements to the academic program as well as to the physical facilities were needed, and he turned all his attention to both these aspects. His bias in favor of math and sciences was fully developed by the team that was soon to be formed.

In the mid-fifties, he recruited a young man to teach mathematics and physics to the graduating classes. It was an inspired choice. This young man, Mr. Ralph Bistany, was the nucleus who recruited and lead a team that, with the futuristic vision of Mr. Charles Saad, laid the foundation and developed the school to meet the challenges of the 21st century.

The sixties and early seventies saw an explosion in numbers and innovations, and the school continued to grow and prosper attracting an increasing number of students from abroad. The mid-seventies marked the beginning of a sad decade for Lebanon, but for *ISC*, through that very dark cloud came one bright ray of sunshine – the start of the expansion. It was in January 1976 that the first school outside Lebanon was started in Sharjah, United Arab Emirates with seventeen students.

In 1981, Charles Saad passed away entrusting Mrs. Leila Saad and Mr. Ralph Bistany with the existing schools and the dream of further expansion. What followed exceeded his dreams. In 1983, the first school in Europe was started, and in 1985, the first school in the US was started.

In 1983, it became impossible to keep the school going in Choueifat and the choice between moving to a safer location or closing had to be made. True to the spirit of perseverance against all odds, a decision was made to move the school to Beirut and rent temporary premises there for three months. Sadly, the three months turned out to be nine long and difficult years.



In 1990, events in the country took a turn for the better, and it was possible to move back to Choueifat. The ravages of war had not spared the campus which was in a sad state of destruction but rebuilding it, which had to come in phases, was started immediately. In October 1992 the school operation moved back to Choueifat to the great joy and jubilation of everyone. The rebuilding and improvements have continued to this day.

The vigorous revival of the Alumni Association in 2002 has reestablished the link between the school and its graduates – a link that is invaluable to both. Many have worked hard for this revival but special mention is due to the Alumni Association Board presided by Dr. Samir Alam whose unrelenting efforts have been an inspiration to all.



The International School of Choueifat – Choueifat was one of the first schools in Lebanon to use Information Technology in its operation. In the mid-sixties technology was used to improve the administrative operation and in the early eighties the students were introduced to the use of computers. Today the teaching process is benefiting from the computerized teaching and testing programs that are being developed by Intered, the managing arm of the SABIS® School Network.

In the early nineties, the SABIS® Organization was formed to ensure the continuity of the quality and the growth of the schools. There are now thirty-one schools that are members of the SABIS® School Network educating over 28,000 students worldwide. A board was formed to carry the organization through the 21st century and set the course for the 22nd century thus, keeping the flame that was lit 120 years ago alive and burning vigorously.

The list of those who have contributed to making Choueifat what it is today is long – some are well known while others have contributed quietly and silently but all have earned the gratitude and thanks of *ISC*. To them and to all the Choueifat and the SABIS® family, the board has renewed its pledge to maintain academic excellence, remain on the cutting edge of technology, and to continue to "form men and women with the ability and morality to face the challenges of the future!"



SABIS® Students in Minnesota and Frankfurt Excel on AP Exams


At a time when schools world-wide are being criticized for not challenging their students and not doing enough to prepare students academically for college or university, two schools in the SABIS®

School Network, the International School of Minnesota (ISM) and the Internationale Schule Frankfurt-Rhein-Main (ISF), have reported outstanding participation rates and results on the 2005 Advanced Placement exams.

The International School of Minnesota, now in its twenty-first year in operation, announced its AP results in early September 2005. With a total of forty-five students in grades 10-12 sitting exams, ISM reported 76% of its students earning scores of 3, 4, or 5 on the 2005 exams. In the 12th grade alone, 88% of ISM seniors sat APs with the number of AP exams taken by student averaging out to just under six exams.

Always striving to improve, 95% of the forty-five ISF students who sat 2005 AP exams earned scores of 3, 4, or 5, a siginificant improvement over 2004 results. 90% of the twenty-eight ISF seniors sat AP exams in an average of five subjects each.

Following a set curriculum that maximizes the time spent in class learning and incorporates practice questions from past AP exams, SABIS® students in each of the thirty-one schools put their knowledge to work. Upon leaving his AP Calculus AB exam in May of 2005, one *ISF* student commented, "*There was nothing on the exam that I had not already done a million times."*

Directors at both schools, Mrs. Sue Berg and Mr. Richard Long, are quick to point out that the results in and of themselves are outstanding. "The fact that we are achieving these results with a non-selective admissions policy makes the accomplishment even more remarkable.
